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EDITORIAL

My husband's grandfather was born in the small village of Little Drayton Common, Shropshire, on July 24th, 1876. His name at birth was recorded as ARTHUR AUSTIN, son of William Austin and Mary Austin (nee Barrow).

On March 3rd, 1902, ARTHUR AUSTIN (then aged 25 years) married MABEL KATE PAINTER, (then aged 20 years), daughter of Charles Painter, deceased, and Elizabeth R. Painter (nee Clutterbuck) at Hunslet, near Leeds, West Yorkshire, England.

It is not known why they decided to marry in Leeds, as Arthur came from Shropshire and Mabel came from Gloucestershire. The only apparent reason for this was Mabel's pregnancy of seven months at the time of the marriage.

I am now in possession of the birth certificates of the female children, and letters of confirmation of some of the male children's births. These records provide the following information:-

DORIS MAY AUSTIN, daughter of Arthur Austin and Mabel Kate Austin was born May 13th, 1902, at Leonard Stanley, Gloucestershire.

REGINALD ARTHUR AUSTIN was born 21st February, 1904.

MABEL KATE AUSTIN, daughter of Arthur Austin and Mabel Kate Austin (nee Painter) was born December 17th, 1905, at Little Drayton, Shropshire.

RONALD AUSTIN, son of Arthur Austin and Mabel Kate Austin (nee Painter) was born September 2nd 1907, at Little Drayton, Shropshire.

ARTHUR CHARLES AUSTIN, son of Arthur Austin and Mabel Kate Austin (nee Painter) was born October 21st, 1910, at Little Drayton, Shropshire.

During part of this era ARTHUR AUSTIN served six years with the Shropshire Light Infantry, but the dates of service are not known at this time. I have written to the Ministry of Defence in England on two occasions, enclosing two stamped addressed envelopes, but have not had the courtesy of a reply. I did hire a genealogist in Barking, Essex, to try to obtain this information on my behalf, but this venture was fruitless.

It is believed that the family emigrated to Canada between October 1910, and 1914. The next child was born in Canada, namely MARY ELIZABETH BEECH, on September 15, 1914, at Petrolia, Ontario, Canada. Her Canadian birth certificate shows her father as ARTHUR JOHN BEECH, and her mother as MABEL KATE PAINTER.

Also in my possession are Army papers for ARTHUR JOHN BEECH, dated July 29th , 1915, at which time he joined the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force. These papers give his date of birth as July 21st, 1879, and place of birth as Market Drayton, Shropshire. These papers state that he served for six years in the Shropshire Light Infantry.

It might be noted that the date of birth on the birth certificate does in fact differ by 3 years and 3 days from the date of birth on the Army papers. However, the Beech family has a bad habit of celebrating birthdays on incorrect days. Mabel Kate Beech, for example, who is still alive, celebrates her birthday on December 10th, when her birth certificate states December 17th. Also my mother-in-law, Mary Elizabeth Witheridge (nee Beech) always celebrated her birthday on September 17th, when in fact her birth certificate states September 15th.

They were also in the habit of changing Christian names. For example, Mabel Kate Beech still likes to be referred to as Mabel Katherine Josephine Beech. It is quite likely that she takes after her father, who has Arthur on his birth certificate and was always known as Arthur John in Canada.

Another record in my possession is the Canadian passport of ARTHUR.J. BEECH, which is dated June 5th 1919. This document shows his date of birth as July 21st 1876 (the same as ARTHUR AUSTIN'S birth certificate) and place of birth as Shropshire. His age was listed as 42 years at that time.

I have written to the PRO at Chancery Lane, London asking about the British Passport, or alternatively, emigration documents which they must have had to leave Britain, but they advise me that I would have to attend personally to look up this information as they do not offer assistance in research.

I have identified the time of the name change as being between October 1910 and September, 1914.

The National Archives in Ottawa, Canada, have agreed to forward Passenger Lists, on an inter-library basis, on ships arriving in Montreal and Halifax during the time period 1910-1814. Upon receipt of the micro-films twelve in all - I will have to go through them to see if either name - Austin or Beech - appears.

MABEL KATE BEECH is 85 years old and resides in Toronto, Canada. She has never married and professes the name of Beech, although her birth certificate shows the name Austin.

I am afraid there may be a "skeleton in the closet", as when I bring up the subject of name change she is most vague in her reply. She did once tell me that she thought the name has been double-barrelled at one time

and that the Austin part had been dropped. I do not really believe this as no records show it as such. Where did Beech come from and why was the Austin part dropped? None of this makes any sense to me. Can one change one's name in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean? I do have a few more steps I can take, but all this is very expensive and time consuming. Nevertheless, I am determined to solve the mystery.

Recently I joined the Shropshire Family History Society and forwarded a description of my dilemma to them. It immediately caught the eye of one lady, and although she admitted she had little time to do research on my behalf, she coudn't resist having a "dabble". She searched the records of the King's Shropshire Light Infantry at Shrewsbury, but could find nothing. She was advised that if Arthur Austin's records were dated after 1913, they could possibly have been destroyed as they were kept in Hayes, near London. It was thought that perhaps the PRO at Kew might be able to advise. If, as believed, Arthur Austin emigrated to Canada in 1912, then the date of his British Army Service must have been prior to 1913.

It was once put to me that the children might not have had the same father, but all the dates and place of birth seem to refute this theory.

Some time ago, I obtained a piece of paper from the home of my husband's late mother, the child born in Canada. On the paper it stated that the family emigrated to Canada between 1910 and 1912 having sailed on either the Cunard ship "Melita", or the "Valcartier". There was a notation "A.W.O.L", which I understand to mean "Absent without Leave". This may be a clue!

I still have to look through the twelve micro-films to see if I can find which side of the ocean the name change took place. Should anyone be able to offer other ideas, I would greatly appreciate hearing from you.

One of my childhood memories is of my mother telling me that she had once managed to put a wood chisel right through her hand, and my father had poured a whole bottle of iodine over it, and it had healed perfectly. (She was probably trying to persuade me to take some medicine!) Like many ladies of her generation she had been taught wood carving. Later I inherited that chisel.

I still have it, and despite a vast amount of work, it is still my favourite, a beautiful tool, it keeps its edge, and has a fine octagonal handle, still clearly marked with my grandfather's name - F.R. Witheridge.

He died in 1899, long before I was thought of, but I like to think that some of its work will live on for many years, as one of my tasks before retiring was to refurbish an old, long derelict car, appropriately also of 1899. This involved some wood carving, making a footboard support to match one still existing which was carved with a scroll design. This car, once raced by a then famous driver, is the Canstatt Daimler, now preserved in the Daimler-Benz Museum in Germany.

I feel sure grandfather would approve.

Incidentally, his talents must persist. My mother was quite a capable woodworker, and took an active interest in things mechanical, as does her granddaughter, my niece in the nursing profession, who can't resist finding out how things work, and is quite good at all sorts of repairs!

WAS THERE ANYONE IN CELL BLOCK "H"?

If there is anyone harbouring a suspicion that a "lost" ancestor might have been a guest of H.M. Government, I can set his or her mind at rest - at least concerning one particular time and one specific place.

On the night of Sunday, 3rd April, 1881, Census night, 1,054 persons were within the grim walls of H.M. Prison, Princetown, Dartmoor. The prison was built partly at the instigation of Sir Thomas Tyrrwhit, a local magnate, during the Napoleonic Wars to contain French prisoners who were housed in prisons and on prison ships at Plymouth. They can hardly have appreciated the transfer from Plymouth since they had to be marched some sixteen miles over the roughest terrain in Devonshire to reach Princetown which is known for the worst climatic conditions in the County. It has a high rainfall, bitterly cold winds, fog and snow. Railway engines have been known to disappear up to the smoke chimney in snow!

Sir Thomas was determined to promote the prosperity of the moor, but in spite of his efforts to make Princetown a centre of local agriculture and industry it really only existed to serve the prison. When the Prison was closed in 1816 and fell into disrepair, Princetown declined, but revived with the coming of a railway and the re-opening of the prison in 1850.

Of the 1,054 persons inside the walls on Census night, 1881, eleven were female. They were the wives, children and servants of the Governor and his Deputy and his Steward. Of the males, 48, including the Governor and his Deputy, were officials, warders and staff and the rest were prisoners, including a man of 74.

Every trade and occupation was represented, some styled simply as "Thief". They came from far and wide, but I'm glad to say, no Witheridge was among them.

The name was not unknown, however, as outside the walls, living in "The New Buildings", were Richard Witheridge, aged 40 a "store keeper at H.M. Prison" and his wife Eliza. His older children, Francis, aged 15, Hester aged 12, and William aged 9, were born at Buckland Monachorum, but the youngest, Eliza aged 3, was born at Princetown.

One other connection with the prison emerged from the search of this 1881 Tavistock Census - at Whistley Down Farm, Buckland Monachorum, Thomas Witheridge aged 48, was living, and he was described as "Farmer - 50 acres, and Pensioner from H.M. Convict Service."
