Not too far in the future is our Witheridge re-union and Annual General Meeting which is to be held at Alderton, Gloucestershire, on Monday, 2nd May, 1994, and we would welcome any ideas for our entertainment on that day.

FINANCE REPORT BY JOHN WITHERIDGE - UNCASHED CHEQUES YEARS 1989/90/91/92

Some of you will know quite a lot about this situation and to you I would like to express my personal gratitude, and the thanks of all our committee, past and present for helping us out of a hole. To those of you who have not become involved, I will just say that you were the lucky ones amongst our membership to escape this six months' ordeal.

It came to the committee's attention during our Annual General Meeting that there was a large number of un-cashed cheques which had accumulated in the last four years, which left us with only £82.72p in the Society's current account. This was not enough to pay the claims for paper to print the Witheridge Times, or to pay for the postage for letters written to you, or to pay for some of the certificates that are obtained to prove our research. This was a situation which had to be arrested and brought under control.

When pressed, I reluctantly agreed to take up the problem and sort out the situation once and for all. This task I have now completed - thanks to you.

You will remember that I started another separate account for incoming subscriptions in June/July, 1992, and it was this which has kept us afloat, and at least we had a little money to keep our heads above water.

I can now tell you, not without a small amount of pride, that we have £810.12 in my Membership Account. Add to this the £82.72p that we have frozen in the Treasurer's Account, and we have a total of £892.84p. I am still expecting a few extra incoming payments to be made which will take our cash in hand to well over £900.00p. Now I must tell you that there are accounts to settle out of this figure, mainly for last year and this year's running costs, and of course the cost of postage involved in redeeming those out of date cheques.

At this point I really would like to stress to you all what we owe to those who really put themselves out to find the answer to the problems in which they were unwittingly involved. To those who have spent time and money in redeeming their original cheques, for the haste in which they worked, and their dedication to our Society and endeavours to keep it a going concern, I say "Thank you -all of you".

As part of the agreement for co-operation from some members (and I can understand why) I agreed to go through the accounts to ensure that there were no monies unaccounted for or misappropriated. This I did without relish. Apart from the fact that insufficient records had been kept I am glad to say that nothing untoward was found.

Our difficulties arose from the lack of detail recorded on the receipt of cheques from overseas members, and on the origins of other cash received. There was confusion over cheques which had been re-written to replace cheques which had not been presented on time.

Throughout this period we have lost many of our original membership. Some of those who answered my letter to find out the cause of their leaving made reference to the fact that they had posted their subscriptions for one, two, three years, and the cheques were not cashed, so the attitude developed - "Do without it". In some cases we managed to reach a compromise. To these members too, I say "Thank you for giving the Society another chance."

As to some twelve or more members whom we have lost, I am sorry that I could not persuade them to remain members, but we did give them a parting gift of the magazines for four years before it was found that they were no longer members.

I regret the necessity for this report, but I was raised by a lady who could make money last for ever. One lesson I was taught by my mother was that other people's money must be handled with the utmost care, even to the exclusion of one's own money. This is the principle that I have adopted for the last eighteen months when handling your money. I will continue in this mode for as long as you wish me to remain your Membership Secretary.

CAN WE CONNECT THE WITHERIDGE FAMILY WITH THE BRONTE FAMILY?

Florence Mabel Witheridge was born on 16th March, 1876, in Darlington Township, Ontario. She was the eighth child of John Witheridge and Miriam (Moore) Witheridge, who were both born in Bradworthy, Devon. On 14th November, 1906, at Crystal City, Manitoba, Canada, Florence Mabel, aged 30 years, married Thomas $\underline{BRANWELL}$ Wood, (spelled 'Bramwell' on his birth certificate).

Being a good old 'Yorkshire lassie' when I first saw the name 'Branwell' the Brontë sisters came to mind. The only Branwell I had previously heard of was Branwell Brontë, brother to Maria, Elizabeth, Charlotte, Emily Jane and Ann Brontë, of Haworth, Yorkshire. I had no alternative but to start digging!

I couldn't rest until I commenced my research. I obtained excerpts from the Wood family Bible, and found that Thomas Bramwell Wood was the son of William Wood and Sarah Jane (Heaton) Wood. 'Heaton' was another well known Haworth name, the family home being Ponden Hourse, Haworth. The Heatons were a important family of the area, and in fact, may have been the family upon which the Linton family of "Wuthering Heights" was based.

My appetite was truly whetted when I learned that Sarah Ann Heaton, daughter of John Heaton, mason, was born in Haworth, Yorkshire on 26th June, 1845.

I applied to the Superintendent Registrar at Bradford, Yorkshire, to obtain a birth certificate for Sarah Ann Heaton. I was advised that he had checked with Keighley registry office, as Haworth came under Keighley - and he had been unable to locate a Sarah Ann born on June 26th 1845. At Bradford they located the marriage certificate of William Wood (22) son of John Wood, weaver, to Sarah Ann Heaton (22) daughter of John Heaton, mason, on 9th June 1866, at the Bradford Parish Church. Also at Bradford they located another Sarah with the same father as mentioned on the first marriage certificate, but the date of birth was not 26th June, 1845, and the father's occupation was not the same. I am not sure whether to take a chance and obtain this certificate, since they did not advise me how far out the date was. Would it be worth spending my £5.50 to find out?

This is as far as I have researched at this time of writing. Perhaps I am becoming excited for no reason, but to make a connection to the Brontë family would be more than merely interesting!

ESPERANTO- WHAT IS IT?

Is it a 'plane? Is it a bird? Is it a new type of expresso coffee? - NO! Esperanto is an international language, and spoken by six million people in the world. Over 100 years ago, a Polish Jew named Ludovic Zamenhoff living on the border of Poland and Russia, realised that there was friction and misunderstanding among the people living around that area, so he decided to invent a new language - a simple, easy-to-learn language.

Zamenhoff spoke seventeen languages, so he mixed a few Euopean easy to speak languages together (with a bit of English thrown in), and Esperanto was born. To identify themselves Esperantists wear a little badge, it's a green star on a white background. The word 'Esperanto' means hope, and the dictionary defines it as being "an artificial language designed as a medium for persons of all nations."

My late husband, Arthur, was a keen Esperantist and learned to speak the language fluently in six months. To him, Esperanto was "a window on the world".

Each year, an International Congress is held in a different country. One year it was held in Warsaw, and six thousand people from thirty different countries attended. Picture yourself being one of such a large group, able to converse with each other, not each in his own language, but in the one international language, Esperanto.

I had the privilege of attending such a gathering in Vancouver in 1984. Approximately three thousand people were there, and it was a thrill to see a large group from China. It was the first time they were allowed to attend such a function. One night, most of the folk dressed in their national costume, and all the cameras worked overtime as everyone sought to capture such a kaleidoscope of dazzling colours.

Many books including scientific and classics have been written and translated into Esperanto. This includes the Bible and every Sunday my husband carried his Esperanto Bible to Church.

We had an interesting experience whilst travelling overseas and met by chance the lone Esperantist. It happened as we were walking along a street in Malaga, southern Spain. A tall stranger coming towards us grabbed my husband's arm and shook it violently. I became alarmed and thought we were being attacked, but it became evident that our stranger was wearing an Esperanto badge and recognised the one my husband was wearing. The two strangers became instant friends. One Yugoslav and one "Aussie" chattered away quite happily in the International Language - Esperanto.

If you are interested in pursuing a new hobby such as learning a new easy language, making friends from all over the world (think of all the lovely stamps you'll gain) learn Esperanto. It will indeed give you a "window on the world".


The Witheridges of Totnes and Newton Abbot.

We, the Society's researchers, have been working away for a long time building this tree, (see pages 12 & 13) and we still have a long way to go. The earliest recorded events so far linked to this family occurred in 1806 and 1829.

On the 9th of February in 1806, John and Jane Witheridge brought their infant son, William, to Dittisham Church to be baptised. In 1829 on the 4th October, William, now a man of 23 years was married to Susan Brimicombe in the church at Stoke Gabriel, (see page 11) which lies 2 miles NNE of Dittisham, and on the other bank of the river Dart. These two events are recorded in the IGI listings for the county of Devon as published in 1988.







It was the birth certificate of Edward Wetheridge, b1849 (see above) which linked those IGI events to this family. This certificate told us that Edward's father was William and that his mother's maiden name was Susan Brimmicombe. In the 1851 census for Halwell we found the household of William and Susan Wetheridge, and noted where they were born, as follows:



Higher Poulson, Halwell, Elizabeth, 14, Servant, born Halwell.


In the 1891 census we found the family of James, the son, shown in the 1851 census household of William and Susan above. In 1891 James was married to Hannah (Jerman) and living in Kingskerswell near Newton Abbot. The census details are as follows:



In this 1891 census we also found James' eldest son now living away from home and in the household of Henry Crocker, Butcher, as follows:

Main St, Kingskerswell, John, 18, Assist't Butcher, born Paignton

This is a strictly landlubber family, who found employment as Servants, Gardeners, Agricultural Labourers, and Butchers. Yet their origins are in Dittisham and within spitting distance of the birth places of some of the world's most famous seafarers.

Directly westwards from Dittisham church on the other bank of the Dart is Greenway House. This was the birth place of Humphrey Gilbert and his two brothers Adrian and John. Otho Gilbert, the boys' father died when Humphrey was eight, and his mother, Katherine Champernowne of Modbury, then married Walter Raleigh of Hayes Barton near Exmouth. Katherine and Walter had a son, b1577, who was also named Walter. Walter Raleigh and his Gilbert half brothers grew up together living at Greenway farm, or at the other Gilbert family seat, Compton Castle near Torquay.

Directly to the north of Dittisham, also on the other bank of the Dart, is a farm called 'Sandridge'. It was here that John Davis was born. John Davis was a childhood friend of Walter and his Gilbert half brothers.

I'm sure the river Dart was a major influence on the lives of these boys. The river is tidal all the way up to Totnes a further 2 miles up stream from Dittisham. The river is also difficult to navigate with its numerous mud banks. This was where the seamanship skill of these youngsters was developed, and which proved to be so useful to them in their adult lives.

We all know of Sir Walter Raleigh's gallant act when he put his cloak over a puddle to enable the queen to pass, dry footed. He was also one of Queen Elizabeth's court favourites, that is until he lost her favour after seducing one of her maids of honour. For this the Queen threw him in the Tower of London. He was also a seaman of renown, he took a major part in, or led, many expeditions, generally against Spain or her allies. Some of these expeditions were for his country and some on his own behalf. One of his main endeavours was the colonisation of Virginia.

In 1578 Sir Humphrey Gilbert obtained a patent for six authorizing him to take possession of "any remote barbarous and heathen lands not possessed by any Christian prince or people" During 1578 Gilbert led a piratical expedition against the Spaniards. Walter Raleigh accompanied him as the captain of the "Falcon". Sir Humphrey Gilbert is best known as the founder of the Newfoundland colony. In 1585 John Davis, discovered the North-west passage.

What of this Totnes and Newton Abbot family in todays world? Six generations after William, b1806, we have a strong crop of youthful landlubbers, some married with young families and others of marriageable age. If I had to guess which family would carry our surname on the furthest into the future, it would be this one, and yet not a single member of this family has joined our society.

In the generations alive today there are some men of stature. We caught a glimpse of Raymond Witheridge, b1920, in the Daily Telegraph Newspaper report of the 24th July 1989, under the headline "Glider Instructor and Pupil Injured". The report was as follows:

"A gliding instructor and his pupil were taken to hospital with broken backs yesterday after they crashed on take-off at Old Sarum Airfield, Salisbury, Wilts. The instructor, Mr Raymond Witheridge, 69, of Runnymede Avenue, Bournemouth, and Mr Arthur Poulton, 45, of Downton, Salisbury, were practising take-off by mechanical winch when the glider became detached from the winch and a wing touched the runway".

We reported later on Raymond's full recovery and his return to gliding. We believe that Raymond was a bomber pilot during the second world war.

Raymond's younger brother Donald is also worth noting. Today he is the head of a holiday organisation called 'Blue Riband Holidays' at Hemsby. Also involved are a number of his children and grandchildren. The Society was once offered this centre as the venue for our 'Witheridge Day' gettogethers. This offer was not taken up as this venue is not central enough and our members would have had to travel further to attend.

This family line is not yet complete. We still have further research to exploring this family's origins before 1806. Where were William's parents, John and Jane Witheridge, born and married? Did William have any brothers or sisters? Our next search will be to find the records of these events in the registers of Dittisham Church.

Our thanks go to member Flo Streatfield who has supplied another certificate to support the history of the Australian section of the Tavistock family tree (see Magazine Volume 7, Number 3, Autumn 1993). The birth certificate of Alfred Richard, fourth child of Alfred Witheridge and Polly, shows that he was born on the 27th January, 1886, at Callington, South Australia. We had thought that he was born in 1888 - there is nothing to beat getting a look at the documents! Thank you Flo!

Our thanks also to new member John James of Vancouver, Canada, who has sent us certificates of the Combe Martin-Helston family from whom he is descended. His great grandfather was Robert Witheridge who married Elizabeth Ann Kitchen in 1854, and John has $\underline{\mathsf{two}}$ Witheridge grandmothers - intriguing isn't it? We hope to publish the family story later.

 $\overline{\text{FOUND}}$ - and lost at the same time! Velma Metcalfe of $\overline{\text{Welli}}$ ington, New Zealand, has found a marriage certificate for her great grandfather's brother, James. Is that unusual? What is unusual is that James, born 1841 at Combe Martin, was thought to have been unmarried, and his death certificate gives no indication of marriage - so we have found a Witheridge wife, and lost her again.

It looks as if there may be a story here, and we hope that Velma will be able to enlighten us in due course.

FOUND - A LINK BETWEEN THE YEALMPTON FAMILY WITHERIDGE AND THE ERMINGTON FAMILY WITHERIDGE

At last we have proof that there is a connection between the two south Devon families - perhaps not in the way we might expect. If you study the family tree you will find two ladies of the Northmore family married two of our lads, one in each family. We have known of these two girls for some years, but even now it is not that simple. They were not sisters, not even first cousins, their respective Northmore grandfathers were brothers.

But now let me confuse matters completely. There are even more links between the two Witheridge families. Mary Northmore, born 1804, married Philip Witheridge in 1828. She was the granddaughter of Solomon Northmore, born 1741. (Solomon married Elizabeth Veal - could she be related to the Charity Veal, prominent in the Combe Martin tree - the family who moved to Cornwall and later to Australia?)

Mary's father, John Northmore, had a brother Stephen, born 1774, and both married girls from the Horton family - hence the name Francis Northmore Horton Witheridge, born 1845, Ermington branch. To take this confusion even further, Stephen had four sons, two of whom married Mary Colemans - one actually 'Mary Ann' both from Ermington, and another Coleman, Betsey, married Henry Witheridge, born 1797, also in the Ermington branch.

Have you had enough of this? Well - just one more! Rebecca Northmore's grandfather, Richard Northmore, born 1745, married Damaris Sandover. Was Damaris an aunt to Maria Tall Sandover who married John Northmore Witheridge in 1867? It is noted that in 1769, a Richard Sandover was a witness at the wedding of Solomon Northmore and Elizabeth Veal.


Perhaps all the families should unite and research under the name of one society - Wit/hor/thmore/man/dover?

Let me have just one more name. Rebecca's uncle Thomas, born 1789, married a Sarah Atwill, born 1794. Now I wonder, could she be a relation of our Mary Atwill of Whitchurch and Tavistock? Sarah, we are told, lived near Buckland Monachorum, a stone's throw from Tavistock.

THE KIN TO JOHN OF STROOD

It is very rare in this day and age to have the good luck, whilst carrying out research, to discover a complete family that has been unknown to us. This is a slight over statement, but it has been my good fortune (with the exception of one person) to do just this. The one person is John Witheridge of Strood, near Rochester in Kent. I make reference to the family tree that you will find in your Handbook - the Rochester, London, Birmingham tree. If you remember I made further reference to this family earlier this in the Witheridge Times, Volume 7, Number 1, Spring 1993, on pages 17/18.

Let me explain - John Witheridge, born circa 1740 or 1743, married Sarah King in 1768. He was the son of William Witheridge and Mary Mills.

John was the fourth child of a family of seven. His oldest brother attained the highest possible position in local government at this period in time - that of High Constable for the Hundreds of Chatham - Assistant to the Lord Lieutenant for the County of Kent and he was also Minister's Warden at least twice in his lifetime, may be more.

We have knowledge of his grandparents, and almost certain links to one of the Devonshire families. By the time I am ready to share this family and my knowlege of their lives with you in this magazine of ours, I hope to prove to which family they belong. It could be your family line!

So may I please book a page or two, and the centre fold of the magazine at some time in the future, to present the tree and report of this distinguished family? I can assure you that the contents will be charged with drama, intrigue, power and pain! I shall look forward to your company as we explore Chatham in the 1700/1800's.

Whilst in the Strood Archives office, researching the above family, the Archivist who was helping me to locate one of the members of the family enquired, after noticing the variations in the spellings of our names i.e., Witheridge and Wetheredge, "What is the difference in the names?"

Without hesitation I replied "E Numbers"! Upon which he countered - "Fitness in the spelling, I presume!"
