Barbara and Terry Finemore

As some of you will know, just a few weeks after our 2004 reunion, Terry Finemore suffered a major heart arrhythmia and collapsed, causing a serious head injury. During a lengthy period in intensive care, Terry was fitted with an implanted defibrillator, which should prevent any further arrhythmia.

Sadly, though, the head injury has had long-term effects, and for the foreseeable future Terry will have to be in a special care home in Plymouth, coming home for the day on Saturdays and Sundays. Terry has recently been able to sing again in the church choir - something he has done most of his life. So deep-seated are the responses and music that, despite his impaired memory, Terry was able to participate in the service without even using books or music!

It is hoped that Terry will eventually make sufficient progress for him to come home permanently, but this is unlikely to be in the immediate future. Naturally all this has been extremely distressing for Barbara, particularly as their daughter Fiona and her family live so far away. Recently Barbara has herself been unwell, and is also having to cope with all the formalities connected with Terry's present condition. We send Barbara, Terry and Fiona our love and prayers, and trust that Terry will soon begin to show the hoped-for improvement.

Kim's health.

Kim was diagnosed with colon cancer in May, a few days after the reunion. After months of scans and other tests, she had major surgery in August. Post-operative tests showed that all the cancer had been removed, and as histology reports showed no sign of further abnormal cells, no chemotherapy was needed - a great relief for Kim and all the family. Despite some complications, including an MRSA infection, Kim is now making progress, and hopes to be back to pre-surgery fitness by Christmas. (Can't say full health, as she wasn't in full health to start with!)

Graham Browne



Cause of Death?

In Bradworthy Cemetery there is a headstone to William Witheridge, born 1824 died 1846.

The inscription reads:

Sacred to the Memory of William Son of John and Grace Witheridge of this Parish Who died December 7 1846 Aged 22 years.

An inflammation seiz'd my brain Which baffled the great skills of men A fortnight's pain and grief I bore Till death thrill'd thro' my heart so sore. One wonders what this inflammation might have been. Fevers such as typhoid, arising from drinking contaminated water, were quite well known by 1846, so it seems unlikely that it was something of that nature. One wonders whether it was meningitis, which even today has often "baffled the great skills of men."

Further information on James Witheridge, another son of John and Grace, comes from a transcript of the Parish records made locally by a number of people including the late Cecil Collacott, who was such an excellent guide for our 10th anniversary tour of Bradworthy.

James, son of John and Grace born 2 August 1835 "found dead near village at Waterland Bridge at about 4pm 18 September 1885". This seems to have been a natural death, as there is no record of any suspicious circumstances. Could it have been a stroke, or perhaps a heart attack?.

If anyone has copies of the death certificates for either of these Bradworthy people, perhaps they can tell us what is recorded on the certificates.

I am grateful to Pamela Glynn, descendant of Ann Witheridge, a daughter of John and Grace, for bringing these two items to my attention.

FOUND by Sheila Jewell. Baptism at the Church of St John, Sutton on Plym, Plymouth.

3rd April 1864. Elizabeth Jane, of Thos and Mary Ann Witheridge, 9 Looe Street, Plymouth, Labourer.

It is interesting to note that there is no mention that Elizabeth Jane was not an infant, but was nine years old when baptised. She was the daughter of Thomas Witheridge and Mary Ann Garry of the Wembury/Plymoufh family, born in 1855 and another omission is that her father was deceased at the time of the baptism, he having died in 1857. This reminds us that we should not assume that baptismal dates are near to birth dates.

Thanks Sheila, this is something we should always be aware of. ED

I found a similar case in the Ermington baptisms where Emma, daughter of Henry and Betsy Witheridge born 22 July 1839 and another daughter Elizabeth of Henry and Betsy, born 27 September 1841, both baptised 17 October 1841. ED

AN UNTIMELY DEATH. By Joyce Browne.

The age of 46 years is young for a woman to be victim of a heart attack, but that is what happened to RUTH BRIDGET WITHERIDGE. She was found dead in bed at her home in 17 Tothill Road Plymouth on 22nd January 1919. There had to be an inquest of course and a Dr William Deery gave evidence that he was called to Tothill Road, by whom it is not stated, where he found the body of a woman aged about 46. The woman was dead but still warm.

Subsequently Dr Deery performed a post mortem examination. He found the death to be of natural causes,"namely syncope from fatty infiltration of the heart".

Ruth Bridget Witheridge was the wife of George Thomas Witheridge, whom she married in Plymouth in 1895. George, born 1869, was the son of George Thomas Witheridge and Emily Ellen Atrill and at the time of his wife's death was a Rigger in H. M. .Dockyard, following in his father's footsteps. George Thomas senior had been a Royal Navy Armourer.

This family originated in Ermington, but had migrated to Plymouth in the early 1800's, where they settled and continued to live. George, the husband of Ruth, was the brother of Emily Ellen Witheridge, grandmother of our member Valerie Wells.

George and Ruth had three children, one Philip, died in infancy and at the time of Ruth's death her daughter Ruth Emmeline was 23 and her son George Philip was 21. This loss of their mother must have been a shock, as evidence at the inquest said that she was not particularly unwell at the time. This evidence was given by Ruth's sister, a Mrs Lavinia Cameron, wife of Samuel Cameron who was clerk to the Plymouth Co-operative Society, living at 119 Grenville Road Plymouth.

It would appear from the report that it was Lavinia Cameron who identified the body of her sister and not George Witheridge, Ruth's husband. Perhaps he was too upset?. Had he gone to work unsuspecting that anything was wrong?.

George lived on until 1943 and did not marry again. His daughter Ruth Emmeline married in 1923, four years after her mother's death and his son George Philip married in 1929, ten years after the sad event.

We are indebted to Sheila Jewell for finding this Coroner's Report, which has provided this interesting information.

NEGATIVE RESEARCH

The September edition of the 'Family Tree' magazine included a free CD Rom of transcriptions of parish registers (marriages only) for some parishes in Cornwall. These are:-

Advent 1676-1801 St. Brewards 1558-1815 St. Clether 1640-1811 Davidstow 1676-1811 Forrabury 1676-1812 St. Juliot 1652-1812 Lanteglos by Camelford 1558 - 1812 Lesnewth 1569-1812 Michaelstow 1548-1812 Minster 1676-1812 Otterham 1687-1811 St Teath 1558-1812 Trevalga 1539-1812

In the last named parish from 1539 to 1549 the Vicar only recorded the name of the husband -'John Kettow was married on 30^{th} January, 1542'. In 1567 he thought to mention the Christian name of the wife 'John Martin and Jone his wife were married 15^{th} May 1567'. From 1568 the woman's surname was recorded now and again. It was not until 1584 that the bride's surname appears regularly, but as late as 1661 there are instances of only the name of the husband being recorded, and for 22 years from 1670 until 1692 there are no marriages recorded.

This is the first parish record I have seen which does not mention the name of the woman.

I searched all the parishes for Wetheridge/Witheridge names but found nothing, and nothing which could be construed as 'Witheridge'.





ERMINGTON CHAPEL REBUILD IN 1891



I have a number of old photographs of family members and a few of the village of Ermington where I was born. The above is one example and shows the laying of the foundation stone for the new Chapel dated 7th October 1891 I have since been able to get the report of this event from the Western Morning Newspaper dated 8th October 1891.

The Chapel was built on the ground of the old Chapel, which was built in 1834. As this was too small for the congregation it was decided to build a new one. The old chapel still had a debt of 75 pound plus an interest charge of 120 pound owing up until 1879 when it was presumably paid off. Renovations to the old chapel were carried out at a cost of 120 pound but due to earth bank nearby it was realised that the masonary and woodwork had been "injured" and decision taken to look to building a new chapel. Another 120 pound was raised and Lord Mildmay acquired a suitable piece of land and had a wall erected around it. Ivybridge people raised 50 pound, and together with Ermington donations a total of 278 pound out of the 600 pound required, was raised by the time the foundation stone was laid. Donations also came from Plymouth Methodists. On the day, another 70 pound was collected.

This shows what can still be found by looking in the right place. One of the people there must be a Witheridge!. No mention of Witheridges in the report though, they must have all been at Church at the time or in the local pubs.!!.

This chapel has in recent years been turned into a private residence showing a sad decline in the numbers attending religious buildings. Ermington has also lost the Gospel hall some years ago. ED.

This branch is one we have known about for some time, but we called it "The Yorkshire Witheridge Family", but now we think that we can with confidence graft it on to the Kent/London/Birmingham tree.

In 1989, a **Mr David Witheridge** of Wetherall, Cumbria, wrote to Philip Witheridge giving some family details and asking for help in tracing the origins of his grandfather **Richard Witheridge**, who died in the Worth Valley district of Yorkshire in 1961, aged 80.

David wanted to know about his grandfather's place of birth and his family origins and so did we - and we have been looking for **Richard Witheridge** ever since!

David's grandmother was Emma Schofield, but she has proved equally elusive.

We thought that if we found the marriage certificate of Emma and Richard it would tell us the names of their fathers. We have never been able to find a marriage certificate nor have we been able to find a birth certificate for Emma or Richard who - if his age of 80 at death was correct, was born circa 1880/81.


Although we could find no official records of Richard we do know that "he was quite well up" in a chromium plating factory. He lived in a large house and had beautiful old furniture. David appreciated his grandfather's taste in furniture but deplored the fact that all the brass handles had been removed and been replaced with chromium plated ones.

One clue that David gave us was that he had an Aunt Alice. She reminisced that she had an uncle Arthur who married an "Alice" and they lived in Birmingham, also that her grandfather came from Devon.

We knew of an **Arthur John Witheridge** who married **Alice Wesson** in Aston Brook Birmingham in 1906. If Richard and Arthur John were brothers, we could connect Richard to the Kent/London/Birmingham families, but other than the memories of Aunt Alice, we could find no evidence.

Kim Cook researched avenues for Richard, including the 1881 and 1901 Census, without success and named Richard on her list of Witheridges who appeared to be missing from the 1901 Census returns.

Arthur John Witheridge, born 1884, who married Alice Wesson, was the son of William Witheridge, born 1852 of the Kent, London. Birmingham family. This had been difficult to prove as Arthur John's birth was registered not as "Witheridge" but as Arthur John Lapworth - his mother Henrietta Lapworth.

William Witheridge born 1852 in Aston, Birmingham, was the illegitimate son of Caroline Witheridge. He was a zinc worker and in 1872 married Elizabeth Bedford in Birmingham and they had four children:-

At the time of the census of 1881, William and his wife Elizabeth were living with their four children at 162 New John Street, Birmingham. William's occupation was given as "zine worker". In the house with them was Caroline Yeomans, William's mother. She had married William Yeomans in 1855, but he must have died before 1881 as she is described as "Widow" occupation "Japanner".

William's life must have been somewhat complicated at this time. He had formed a liaison with Henrietta Lapworth. We don't know whether he left Elizabeth, or she left him, but William set up home with Henrietta.

William and Henrietta never married, although she styled herself "Witheridge" and children born after Arthur John were registered as "Witheridge".

On the 1st February 1890, William made a Will, leaving everything to "my Housekeeper, Henrietta Lapworth and her heirs" - no mentionof any heirs of his. In 1894, at the young age of 42, William died and on the 12th November 1894 Probate was granted to "Henrietta Lapworth, Spinster, Sole Executrix".

Knowing all this made me no nearer to proving my suspicion that Richard was a Lapworth/Witheridge. I could find no birth record for him, either as a Lapworth or Witheridge, neither could I find records for Henrietta, although I looked for likely names such as "Harriett".

I decided to try to find Richard on the Census for 1891 for Warwarickshire, hoping that he would be living with or near William and Henrietta and at least I might find a place of birth.

With the help of Kathy Witheridge of Ontario the 1891 Census for Birmingham revealed what I had been looking for:-

We had discovered Richard, but of course there is the possibility that Richard was Henrietta's son and not William's, although I think this is unlikely.

What is surprising to me is that William's sons by his wife Elizabeth Bedford were living in the household and yet in his Will, William makes no mention of any of his children.

Another item giving food for thought is that, if the ages are correct, Richard was born before William's last child by Elizabeth Bedford. Another question - where was Elizabeth?


A long time ago I coined the word "Glistory" - meaning a glitch in the family history- and I think that this family has several "glistories" to be unravelled.

That must be another story, but I think we can put another twig on the Kent/London/Birmingham family tree.

Where There's a Will...

Kim Cook looks at some Witheridge wills and the families they relate to.

Moses Wetheridge, Mariner

The Will of Moses Wethordige or Wetheridge, Mariner, of His Majesty's Ship Sandwich, was written on 21 March 1743 and proved in London on 11 January 1744 'before the Right Worshipful! John Bettesworth, Doctor of Laws Master Keeper or Commissary of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury'.

This Will poses a number of problems, for it relates to someone whose ancestry we know nothing about. Would it be possible to prove who he was and where he came from? The trail took many fascinating turns.

Within the Witheridge families, the name Moses seems to have been used only by the Wembury branch. When I first came across this Will, I knew of three Moses Witheridges from Wembury. However, none of these could possibly have been the testator in this case, for all were too old. Nevertheless, because of the rarity of this Christian name, and the fact that many of the Wembury family were mariners, I'm convinced he is descended from this branch.

The first known Moses Witheridge, born c1600, married on 10 June 1628 in Wembury Margaret Strapp. The name Strapp was deciphered as such both by me and by the local historian who originally transcribed some of the records for me. But another researcher who has put much of the Wembury information on the IGI has rendered the name as Crapp! No comment!

Moses and Margaret had four sons, Robert (1629, John (1632), Edmond (1634) and Moses (1638). Brenda Dixon, Joyce Marnham, Eric Pover, Rod Witheridge and I are all directly descended from Robert and his wife Agnes Galsworthy.

On 12 August 1663, in Wembury parish church, Moses II, believed to have been a mariner, married Agnis Lowe. They had nine known children - five daughters and four sons, but not all survived. Grace, baptised on 29 December 1666 was buried on 9 January 1667. Robert died at the age of four in 1680. On 2 February 1682, their youngest daughter Rebecca died at just one day old, and within a month mother Agnis was also dead.

Elizabeth, their first-born, now 18, probably became a substitute mother for the other remaining children - Mary (b 1664), Moses III (b 1668), Sarah (b 1671), John (b 1673) and Aaron (b 1680). She cared for her siblings until 1689 when, just 25, she died, and on 19 February 1689 was buried in Wembury churchyard.

I believe (for reasons that will emerge later) that by then Moses III had followed in his father's footsteps and also gone to sea, with his aptly named brother, Aaron, joining him at a later date. So far I've found no record of what happened to Mary, Sarah and John.

Moses II died on 19 January 1692, not at sea, but at his home in Wembury, and was buried there. His Will, which describes him as a mariner of Wembury, Devon, was proved on 2 May 1694 at the Prerogative Court of Canterbury (PCC), the usual probate court for people with property in more than one archdeaconry, or with property on the high seas, or overseas.

From the date of his burial in 1692, there is no record of any known descendants of Moses in Wembury or the surrounding area.

Where had his surviving children gone? Back in the 1970s, when I first indexed the Wembury records, I had no knowledge of the Will of Moses, held in London, and it didn't occur to me to search that far afield.

For many years, the trail went cold - until the indexes to the IGI first became available in fiche form. I soon had most of the Devon entries, but in 1988 I ordered printouts of other counties.

On the 1988 issue of the IGI for London, I found some intriguing entries for children born to Aaron Witheridge and his wife Mary. All were baptised in the church of St Katherine by the Tower. The first, Mary, was baptised on 28 August 1714. Next came Elizabeth, baptised on 22

January 1720, followed by Isabella (described as daughter of Aaron Wetheridge and Hannah, which I suspect is a mistake) on 13 September 1724, and Susannah on 30 April 1727.

Given that Aaron is another very unusual Christian name and, again, one that occurs only in the Wembury branch, I'm fairly confident that this is the Aaron born there in 1680. At present we have no evidence to show when and where Aaron and Mary married, and whether they had any children before Mary. The Wembury Aaron would have been 34 when Mary was born, an age well within the reasonable limits for having children.

St Katherine by the Tower was, and still is, a dockside church, another factor supporting the theory that Aaron was, like his father, a mariner. The gaps between the children's baptisms also suggest that Aaron may have been away for two or three years at a time, consistent with a career on the high seas.

Also in the 1988 issue of the IGI was the marriage of a Moses Witheridge to Elizabeth Reynolds. The wedding took place on 3 August 1738 in the London church of St Andrew by the Wardrobe, at the junction of St Andrew's Hill and what is now Queen Victoria Street.

The King's Wardrobe was the crown repository for royal possessions, including ceremonial robes, furniture and armour. Originally occupying part of the Tower of London, in 1361 it had been moved to a building south-west of St Paul's Cathedral, and a little inland from the river. As there were a number of other London churches with the same dedication, this one soon became known as St Andrew by the Wardrobe. Sadly, the new position of the Wardrobe didn't guarantee its safety, for it burned down in the great fire of 1666, as did the original church of St Andrew.

A new church, the last of 51 city churches designed by Sir Christopher Wren, was constructed between 1685 and 1695. Although bombed out in the London Blitz, and not used again until 1961, the church has been reconstructed, inside and out, to its original design. Furnishings of the period, including the pulpit, font and cover, were recovered from other contemporary churches that were not rebuilt after the war. So the visitor to St Andrew's can well imagine the scene as Moses and Elizabeth married here in 1738.

But their happiness was to be short lived, for this is the Moses whose Will was proved on 11 January 1743. The clue lies in the name of the only beneficiary, *'my loving wife Elizabeth'*. Having commended his soul 'to God who gave it' he commits his body 'to the earth or sea as it shall please God to order'.

Moses then directs that 'all Sum and Sums of money Pay Wages Goods Chattels Effects and Personall Estate of what kind nature or sort soever which shall belong or Appertain to me at the time of my Decease' be given to Elizabeth.

Was Elizabeth still living in London, or had she followed Moses to another port? The executor of the will was Richard Biggs of Portsmouth, a watchmaker, which suggests that they might have been living in Portsmouth at that time. The witnesses were Mary and Richard Laugharne. Internet searches have so far revealed no information about any of these, or about HMS *Sandwich* at the time when Moses was serving on the ship.

Whether Moses and Elizabeth had any children, or whether the widowed Elizabeth eventually remarried, I have been unable to discover.

With no knowledge of what happened after the Will, what can we glean about the previous history of this Moses, whom I call Moses IV?

He certainly wasn't Moses III, who would have been 76 when the Will was written, and therefore not a serving mariner. Did Moses III have any children? Possibly, but I've so far found no record of any, or of a marriage. However, his brother Aaron did have children, and what more natural than to name one after his own father, Moses II?

At the time of his marriage in 1738, Moses IV could have been any age, but was probably in the age range of 18 to 30. This gives an estimated date of birth between 1708 and 1720. The first known child of Aaron and Mary was baptised in 1714, but there could have been others before

then. A Moses born in 1710 would certainly fit in with this family, but at the moment this is just conjecture.

Maybe one day we'll find some hard evidence, but for the time being the circumstantial evidence certainly suggests that Moses IV was the grandson of Moses II of Wembury, and one of the many mariners in this family.

One winter evening, a couple of years ago, I attended a business function at a London venue, where the main reception room overlooked St Katherine's dock. From a long balcony over the water I could see, moored on the opposite side of the dock, a replica ship, probably dating from the 18th century. As I stood there, the sounds of the 21st-century party faded. The ship, reflected in the moonlit water, reminded me of those mariners Aaron and Moses, and the children baptised in the nearby church of St Katherine. Despite the passing of 280 years, somehow they felt very close, and the conviction that Moses Witheridge of HMS *Sandwich* was also of Wembury stock was very strong.

FAMILY BIBLE FOR RICHARD JENKINS. Richard's Maternal Grandfather.

For many years now I have had in my possession my Maternal Grandfather's bible which was presented to him as a Sunday school prize. This also gave the name of the place as Kennards House and was dated March 1889.

Recently whilst on a trip to Devon, Maureen and I decided to try to find Kennards House and according to the map it was just over the border into Cornwall. Having wondered around the area for some time we decided to ask for directions. Most of the area had been turned into a motorway but a lady in the Post office of a close by village pointed me in the right direction. There still remained a little chapel, although this now appeared to be used possibly as a village hall, as there was no indication that it was still a chapel. There were very few houses around it, although one backed on to the chapel and had the name Kennards House on a board. Maureen took a photograph of the chapel. My mother died when I was only 11 months old and I never really knew my Grandfather having met him only once when I was very young. Although I have a photograph of him and my maternal Grandmother, I do not know anything about him or my grandmother. I now intend to try to find out more about them.
